THE FEEDLOT SITE IS LOCATED IN THE SE ¼ OF THE SE ¼ OF SECTION 19, SHELBY TOWNSHIP. THE PROPERTY IS ZONED AGRICULTURAL. (T-105-N, R-28W)

WHEREAS, Wakefield Pork Inc, owner of the following real estate, and Minnesota Pork Inc., operator, in the County of Blue Earth, Minnesota, to wit:

WHEREAS; the Planning Commission of the County on the 5th Day of October, 2011, following proper notice held a public hearing regarding the request, and following due consideration of presented testimony and information, voted unanimously to forward the matter to the County Board with a recommendation for approval subject to conditions contained in staff report PC 24-11, and,

WHEREAS; the County Board on the 5th day of October, 2011, held a public hearing regarding the request, and following due consideration of presented testimony and information, voted unanimously to approve the request subject to conditions included in staff report PC 24-11, and,

WHEREAS, the Blue Earth County Board of Commissioners finds:

1. That the proposed use conforms with the county land use plan.
2. The demonstrated need for the proposed use.
3. That the proposed use will not degrade the water quality of the county.
4. That the proposed use will not adversely increase the quantity of water runoff.
5. That soil conditions are adequate to accommodate the proposed use.
6. That the proposed use does not create a potential pollution hazard.
7. That adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other necessary facilities have been or are being provided.
8. That adequate measures have been or will be taken to provide sufficient off-street parking and loading space to serve the proposed use.
9. That facilities are provided to eliminate any traffic congestion or traffic hazard which may result from the proposed use.
10. That the conditional use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the purposes already permitted.
11. That the establishment of the conditional use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding vacant property for predominant uses in the area.
12. That adequate measures have been or will be taken to prevent or control offensive odor, fumes, dust, noise and vibration, so that none of these will constitute a nuisance, and to control lighted signs and other lights in such a manner that no disturbance to neighboring properties will result.
- NA13. That the density of proposed residential development is not greater than the density of the surrounding neighborhood or not greater than the density indicated by the applicable zoning district.
14. That site specific conditions and such other conditions are established as required for the protection of the public's health, safety, morals and general welfare.

NA15. That the intensity of the proposed residential development is not greater than the intensity allowed in the Agricultural Zoning District. Section 24-111 of the Agricultural District States: "Owners of property, residents, other users of property in the agricultural zone, and neighboring properties adjacent to the agricultural zone may be subjected to inconvenience or discomfort arising from normal and accepted agricultural practices and operations including, but not limited to; noise, odors, dust, operation of aircraft and late night operation of farm machinery, the storage and application of manure, fertilizers, soil amendments, herbicides, and pesticides associated with normal agricultural operations."

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Blue Earth County Board of Commissioners, that the request for a conditional use permit to construct two (2) manure storage structures at an existing feedlot facility. No increase in animal units is proposed. The feedlot site is located in the SE ¼ of the SE¼ of Section 19, Shelby Township. The property is zoned Agricultural is **granted** with the following conditions:

1. That the manure storage structures conform to the site plan attached to this report PC 24-11 and with the plans submitted to the MPCA.
2. That the feedlot be located on a single, legally described parcel consisting of a minimum of 15.78 contiguous acres. Any increase in animal units will require a minimum parcel size of 40 contiguous acres. The parcel shall be a parcel of record, properly recorded in the Blue Earth County Land Records Office.
3. That the applicant obtains a Blue Earth County Construction Permit and an MPCA Construction Short Form Permit before construction begins and within one year from the date the County Board of Commissioners approves the Conditional Use Permit.
4. That all manure storage structures must be designed by a registered engineer according to MPCA requirements. A copy of the designed plans and soil investigation report must be submitted to Blue Earth County Environmental Services prior to the issuance of a construction permit.
5. That the applicant will furnish a final construction report to Environmental Services verifying that the manure storage structure was constructed per approved engineered design plan within 60 days of completion of any new or modified manure storage area. Said construction report shall be signed by the design engineer.
6. That the proposed structures shall be located a minimum of 100 feet from any water supply well, a minimum of 20' from the septic mound and a minimum of 10' from the septic tank.

This Conditional Use Permit shall become effective immediately upon its passage and without publication.

WHEREAS; the County Board on the 18th day of October, 2011, held a public hearing regarding the request, and following due consideration of presented testimony and information, voted unanimously to approve the request subject to conditions included in staff report PC 26-11, and,

WHEREAS, the Blue Earth County Board of Commissioners finds:

1. That the proposed use conforms with the county land use plan.
2. The demonstrated need for the proposed use.
3. That the proposed use will not degrade the water quality of the county.
4. That the proposed use will not adversely increase the quantity of water runoff.
5. That soil conditions are adequate to accommodate the proposed use.
6. That the proposed use does not create a potential pollution hazard.
7. That adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other necessary facilities have been or are being provided.
8. That adequate measures have been or will be taken to provide sufficient off-street parking and loading space to serve the proposed use.
9. That facilities are provided to eliminate any traffic congestion or traffic hazard which may result from the proposed use.
10. That the conditional use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the purposes already permitted.
11. That the establishment of the conditional use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding vacant property for predominant uses in the area.
12. That adequate measures have been or will be taken to prevent or control offensive odor, fumes, dust, noise and vibration, so that none of these will constitute a nuisance, and to control lighted signs and other lights in such a manner that no disturbance to neighboring properties will result.
13. That site specific conditions and such other conditions are established as required for the protection of the public's health, safety, morals and general welfare.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Blue Earth County Board of Commissioners, that the request to reopen an aggregate mining and processing site to resume aggregate mining and processing activities located in the portions of the Conservation and Shoreland Zoned Districts in portions of the N ½ of the SE ¼ and parts of the NE ¼ of the SW ¼ of Section 27, South Bend Township (T-108-N; R-27-W) is **granted** with the following conditions:

1. The mining operations shall be conducted in compliance with the laws of the state and the federal government, especially as related to safety standards, and ordinances and resolutions of the county, as amended from time to time, and in compliance with and furtherance of the approved reclamation plan for the affected land.
2. Clearing of the mining site shall conform to the development and reclamation plan whenever possible. Existing trees and shrubs shall remain in their natural state and not prematurely stripped.
3. Adequate planting, fencing or berming shall be provided along all public roads adjacent to the property involved, sufficient to screen the operation from view.
4. Ingress and egress access points from or onto any road or highway shall be clearly signed, and only those signed access points shall be utilized. All access points must be approved by the highway agency having jurisdiction, and shall preferably be located along a secondary road. All access points shall be located so as to avoid the routing of vehicles to and from the mining operation over streets that primarily serve abutting residential development. Precautions must be taken to minimize the deposit of dirt and mined material from trucks onto the public roads.
5. Trucks used in hauling materials from the site of excavation shall be loaded in such manner as to minimize spillage onto public highways. Any spillage resulting from overloading or from truck tires shall be removed at regular intervals.
6. The amount of overburden to be removed shall not be in excess of that required to undertake operations in an economically feasible manner. Less than ten acres shall be considered economically feasible. Development toward the final plan shall be carried on as excavation progresses. Where ground cover or other planting is indicated on approved plan, such planting shall be made in areas where excavation is completed and land is not being used for material storage.
7. Existing trees and ground cover along public road frontage shall be preserved, maintained and supplemented for the depth of the required roadside setback.
8. Proposed graded or backfilled areas or banks as conforming to the approved reclamation plan shall be covered with sufficient topsoil, based on the availability of existing topsoil, to provide for revegetation. When backsloping is proposed on the reclamation plan, the rate of slope shall not be less than three feet horizontal to one foot vertical. Proposed banks shall be covered with topsoil and seeded.
9. Upon replacement of the topsoil, trees, shrubs, legumes, grasses or other ground cover shall be planted upon the area in order to avoid erosion, in accordance with approved reclamation plan.

10. Upon completion of excavation and associated activities, all buildings, plants and equipment shall be removed within six months, unless such buildings, plants and equipment will be used in the reclamation process.
11. Operating procedures will be utilized to control dust and noise so as not to be in conflict with adjoining property.
12. A reclamation performance bond in the amount of \$38,000 shall be provided prior to commencement of mining activities.
13. That all wetlands on the property be properly protected from any potential sedimentation resulting from mining activities.
14. No mining activities may commence until the access issue has been addressed.
15. That hours of operation shall not exceed the hours of 6:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 6:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon on Saturdays. Hours of operation may include a one half hour quiet time warm up period for vehicles and equipment.

This Conditional Use Permit shall become effective immediately upon its passage and without publication.

Commissioners Bruender, Piepho, and Stuehrenberg voted yes. Commissioner Campbell and Purvis voted no. The motion carried. 2011-304

HUMAN SERVICES

Mr. Phil Claussen, Human Services Director, presented the following items to the Board.

Commissioner Purvis moved and Commissioner Campbell seconded the motion to approve the following items:

Minnesota River Area Agency on Aging (MnRAAA): The purpose of this Memorandum of Understanding is to pass through funds to help support the functions of the Long-Term Care Consultation (LTCC) at Blue Earth County and Long-Term Care Options Counseling (MnRAAA). This Memorandum of Understanding outlines that MnRAAA will now be responsible for screening all individuals entering customized living facilities and assigning a

screening code for everyone who is entering these facilities. These screenings will begin on October 1, 2011, and will indicate if individuals are at low, medium, or high risk.

Home- and Community-Based Care Waivered Services – Living at Home Block Nurse Program:

The purpose of this contract is to provide an additional option for waivered services to include:

- adult companion services
- chore services
- family and caregiver training and education
- social transportation

The term of this contract is from October 1, 2011, through September 30, 2012.

Statewide Health Improvement Program (SHIP) – Grant Amendment: The purpose of this grant is to provide bridge funding to continue with our already-approved SHIP project. The grant extension is from October 1, 2011, through December 31, 2011.

Minnesota Immunization Information Connection (MIIC): The purpose of this grant is to support operations of the regional immunization registry (Immtrack). The term of the grant is from October 1, 2011, through September 30, 2012.

Minnesota Department of Health: Perinatal Hep B and Immunization Practices Improvement (IPI) Grant: The purpose of this grant is to provide funding for duties related to perinatal Hep B case management and IPI activities with our local medical clinics. This grant runs from October 1, 2011, through September 30, 2012.

State of Minnesota Department of Human Services County Grant Contract – Supportive Housing: State of Minnesota provides funding to Blue Earth County as a fiscal agent for the Southern Regional Long-Term Homeless Supportive Housing Project for a 14-county area across southern Minnesota. The term of this contract is from July 1, 2011, through June 30, 2013.

Fourth Amendment to Southern Regional Project and Long-Term Homelessness Agreement By and Between Blue Earth County and Hearth Connections: As fiscal agent for the southern project, Blue Earth County contracts with Hearth Connections for administration and management of supportive services. The term of this contract is from July 1, 2011, through June 30, 2013.

Southern Regional Project and Long-Term Homelessness Provider Agreement By and Between Hearth Connections and Blue Earth County: Hearth Connection contracts with Blue Earth County for a team of staff to provide supportive housing services to residents of Blue Earth, Brown, Faribault, Le Sueur, Martin, Nicollet, Sibley, and Watonwan Counties. The term of the contract is from July 1, 2011, through June 30, 2013.

First Amendment to the Southern Regional Project Services Agreement: Hearth Connections will contract with Blue Earth County in order to provide supportive services to participants in the CD Expansion Project. The term of the agreement is from July 1, 2011, through June 30, 2013.

Memorandum of Understanding between Blue Earth County and VINE Faith in Action: This Memorandum of Understanding is made between Blue Earth County and VINE Faith in Action. The term of this MOU is from September 1, 2011, through August 30, 2012.

Vulnerable Children and Adult (VCA) Act – Service Plan: Blue Earth County is required to complete the VCA service plan which outlines activities to serve both the vulnerable adult population and vulnerable children.

2012-2013 County MFIP Biennial Service Agreement: Blue Earth County Human Services is required to complete a service agreement for our county MFIP population detailing specific plans and initiatives for the identified recipients. The term of this service agreement is January 1, 2012, through December 31, 2013.
